Currently a professor and department chair in the History Department where he teaches World, Hawaiian, and Pacific Islands history, professor Walker is the author of the book *Waves of Resistance: Surfing and History in Twentieth-Century Hawaii*.

Dr. Jerry Walker is an ‘ōlohe lua, an historian, genealogist, retired public health administrator, and co-author of *Kamehameha’s Children Today* and *The Art of Lua*.

She is on the board of Hawaii’s Plantation Village, PlayBuilders of Hawaii and the Filipino-American Historical Society of Hawaii.
